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DIRECTOR'S NOTE:

Howard Crabtree's When Pigs Fly was the first production I ever saw in New York City. Needless to say, it made quite the impression upon the newly out, young, gay man that I was. While at the time I certainly didn't catch all of the double entendre or understand some of the allusions, what stayed with me was the unapologetic way the characters on stage lived their lives openly and without apology. This was something I hadn't seen before in my rural Kentucky upbringing. While I had seen a few examples of camp humor on TV shows like "Soap", "Are You Being Served", and from the iconic Hollywood center square, Paul Lynde, this was my introduction to camp humor, drag, and its incredible over-the-top fashion. I'll be forever grateful to my Uncle Clark for introducing me to Broadway theatre and the gay community, and to Howard Crabtree, Mark Waldrop, and Dick Gallagher for sharing their fearless, witty, and utterly charming storytelling.

Fast forward 27 years and my goodness have things changed in our country! Howard Crabtree's When Pigs Fly was written and premiered the same year as another groundbreaking musical, Jonathan Larson's RENT, and both just three years after Tony Kushner's Pulitzer Prize-winning play, Angels in America: Millennium Approaches. Like his counterpart, Jonathan Larson, Howard Crabtree also did not get to enjoy the opening night of his musical due to succumbing to complications from HIV/AIDS. While guite different in style and form, all three pieces capture important aspects of the gay male experience of the mid-1990s in the United States. While the character of Louis in Angels in America struggles with the fear associated with caring for his sick partner, Prior, and potentially contracting HIV in the process, the character of Howard in When Pigs Fly sings a song about his dream of falling in love with another man and hopefully one day being allowed to get married. At this time, the controversial "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" and Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) were put into place, further ostracizing LGBTQ individuals and polarizing the country. In the subsequent years, great medical advancements have been made in the care, treatment, and prevention of HIV, "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" and "DOMA" were struck down, and in a landmark U.S. Supreme Court case, marriage equality was finally made a reality. In fact, just a few blocks away from the Aronoff Center is the street named in honor of the plaintiffs of that very case, Jim Obergefell and John Arthur. In the 2018 revival of Howard Crabtree's When Pigs Fly, the original "Hawaiian Wedding Day" song was replaced since marriage equality was now a reality and singing about hopefully getting married one day in Hawaii no longer felt relevant to the story. Originally, the song was written to reflect the hope that Hawaii would be the first in the United States to legalize same-sex marriage. In light of recent political, legislative, and social changes in the United States, lyricist, Mark Waldrop, gave us permission to include the original song as a reminder of how far we've come as a community and how easily the rights we often take for granted can be taken away in an instant.

While the script was updated for the 2018 revival to reflect other social and political changes in the United States, the heart of the show remains unchanged and continues to withstand the tests of time, a tremendous compliment to the show's impeccable writing. This musical is a love letter to theatre and the wonderful things that keep bringing us back show after show, year after year. Savvy audience members will enjoy the subtle references to other shows and legendary performers, while everyone will enjoy the silliness designed to simply make us laugh. Like another legendary musical, Jerry Herman and Harvey Fierstein's La Cage aux Folles, the writers of Howard Crabtree's When Pigs Fly do not reference HIV/AIDS, instead wanting to provide joy, escapism, and some much-needed levity for their audiences. Keeping with the tradition of camp humor, the writers don't just provide hollow jokes, but give us a masterclass in satirical writing, still as relevant and still as tongue-in-cheek as ever.

In honor of LGBTQ+ History Month, this production is dedicated to all of the Dreamers like Howard Crabtree and Harvey Milk, the Poets like Mark Waldrop and Dick Gallagher, the Lovers like Jim Obergefell and John Arthur, the Activists like Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera, the Artists like Mickalene Thomas and Zanele Muholi, and the Allies, like you, whose very existence is an act of political power and who make the world a more colorful and better place.

PROFILES

Michael W. Hatton (Director) is an Associate Professor, serving as Head of the NKU Theatre & Dance Program. Mr. Hatton has served in various forms of university governance and service in the past twenty years. Mr. Hatton also serves as Chair of the executive board of the Cooperative Center for Study Abroad (CCSA) and is an active education abroad administrator and teacher, specifically in the United Kingdom. He has worked with multiple educational theatre programs, including the Cincinnati Cappies, CAST, the Children's Theatre of Cincinnati, Uptown Arts, and many others. Mr. Hatton has served as chair of the Pedagogy Symposium for the Mid-America Theatre Conference, and presented research and workshops at various conferences. Additionally, Mr. Hatton has won awards for teaching, including from the Greater Cincinnati Consortium of Colleges and University as well as the NKU Michael C.C. and Susan S. Adams Outstanding Non-Tenure Track Faculty award. Mr. Hatton is a freelance director and stage manager having worked with several regional companies including the Cincinnati Arts Association, Lincoln Boyhood Drama Association, Cincinnati Overture Awards, Showstoppers/Belterra Casino, Cincinnati Men's Chorus, Professional Concepts, the New Edgecliff Theatre, and the Performance Gallery. Mr. Hatton received his MFA in Theatre Pedagogy and Directing from Virginia Commonwealth University.

Cat Schmeal-Swope (Costume Designer) is the Costume Shop Manager at Northern Kentucky University School of the Arts. 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DRAMATURGICAL REFERENCES

Arnold Ziffel was the porcine character featured in Green Acres, an American situation comedy that aired on CBS from 1965 to 1971, starring Eva Gabor and Eddie Albert.



Cyd Charisse was an American dancer and actress known for her glamorous looks and sensual technically flawless dancing in 1950s movie musicals. Most notable were her appearances with actor Gene Kelly in the musical Singin' in the Rain.

Busby Berkeley was an American film director and musical choreographer. His movies were very popular in the 1930s and 1940s. Berkeley devised elaborate musical production numbers that often involved complex geometric patterns.





Mario Lanza was an American tenor and actor. He was a Hollywood film star popular in the late 1940s and the 1950s. He was especially known for his operatic music. "Mario could sing through all three registers effortlessly, without conspicuous gear change."

Light in the Loafers - The phrase "light in the loafers" stems to the 1950s and refers to the "mincing" or "effeminate walking" that's associated with some gay men, according to Matthew Riemer, author of the new LGBTQ history book "We Are Everywhere: Protest, Power, and Pride in the History of Queer Liberation."

Ethel Merman was an American actress and singer. Known for her distinctive, powerful voice, and her leading roles in musical theater, she has been called "the undisputed First Lady of the musical comedy stage." She performed on Broadway in Anything Goes, Annie Get Your Gun, Gypsy, and Hello, Dolly!





Sophie Tucker was an American singer, comedian, actress, and radio personality. Known for her powerful delivery of comical and risqué songs, she was one of the most popular entertainers in the U.S. during the first half of the 20th century. She was known by the nickname "the Last of the Red-Hot Mamas".

Bewitched is an American television sitcom fantasy series about a beautiful witch named Samantha who meets and marries a mortal named Darrin Stephens, a New York ad exec who is shocked to discover that his bride is a witch, and who forbids her from using magic. While Samantha tries to comply with Darrin's wishes and lead the life of a typical suburban housewife, her magical family, led by her mother Endora and father Maurice, disapproves of the mixed marriage and frequently interferes in the couple's lives. Endora refuses even to speak Darrin's name correctly, alternately calling him "Derwood", "What's-his-name", "Darwin", "Dum-Dum", etc., all much to his annoyance.



Ziegfeld Follies / Florenz Edward Ziegfeld Jr. was an American Broadway impresario, notable for his series of theatrical revues, the Ziegfeld Follies, inspired by the Folies Bergère of Paris. He also produced the musical Show Boat. He was known as the "glorifier of the American girl".



DOMA - The Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) was enacted in 1996 and defined marriage, at the federal level, as the union of one man to one woman. DOMA was primarily brought about by a fear that if states granted same-sex couples the right to marry, the federal government, and other states would have to honor those marriages. Section 3 of the act was struck down in 2013 by the decision in United States v. Windsor.

Steve Silver's Beach Blanket Babylon was the world's longestrunning musical revue, which began its run in 1974 and closed in 2019. Known for its reference of gay icons, song and dance, and massive wigs and headdresses, this show reflected camp humor at its finest.



Bob Mackie is an American costume designer known for his extravagant designs and use of feathers, rhinestones, and high glamor. Mr. Mackie began his professional design career working on the Carol Burnett Show where he created the famous "Gone With the Wind" curtain dress. His designs have been worn by countless global entertainers, such as Cher and RuPaul, and remains one of the world's most iconic and recognizable designers. Mr. Mackie designed the costumes for the 2018 revival of Howard Crabtree's When Pigs Fly, paying homage to Mr. Crabtree's original designs.



Shaft (1971 film) is an American blaxploitation crime action thriller film directed by Gordon Parks and written by Ernest Tidyman and John D. F. Black. It is an adaptation of Tidyman's novel of the same name and the plot revolves around a private detective named John Shaft who is hired by a Harlem mobster to rescue his daughter from the Italian mobsters who kidnapped her. The film explores themes including masculinity and sexuality, with a specific emphasis on Black Power. The Shaft soundtrack album, recorded by Isaac Hayes, was also a success, winning a Grammy Award for Best Original Score Written for a Motion Picture. The "Theme from Shaft" won the Academy Award for Best Original Song, making Hayes the first Black man to win the award for that category.

WRITER'S BIOS

HOWARD CRABTREE:

Howard Crabtree was born on November 5, 1954 in Excelsior Springs, Missouri. Named after his father, Crabtree's childhood nickname "Bud" or "Buddy" became part of his stage name for many years. He earned the distinction "most musical" in his senior high school class, and attended college for a year (1973-1974) at Maple Woods Community College in Kansas City. Crabtree stayed in Kansas City for the next two years working with the Missouri Dance Theatre as a dancer and choreographer. In November 1976 he and his first significant boyfriend, Troy Sharp, moved to Las Vegas for more career opportunities. An ensemble role in Folies Bergère soon followed. The costumes and classic Vegas showgirls he encountered there had a lasting impression and their influence can be found in his productions. After moving to New York City with another boyfriend (Buddy Vest), Crabtree worked in restaurants while going to auditions. In the summer of 1978 he had two roles at the Gateway Playhouse on Long Island – in the chorus for Pippin, and as Rocky in The Rocky Horror Show. Six months later, in March 1979, he moved to Canada to pursue ballet. He joined the City Ballet of Toronto, and stayed with this company for the next five seasons. In addition to being a principal dancer, Crabtree choreographed many pieces, and designed costumes for productions such as The Nutcracker, Peter and the Wolf, and Alice in Wonderland. During the mid-1980s, Crabtree returned to New York and worked in the wardrobe departments of several Broadway shows. While working backstage at La Cage aux Folles, he and a friend, Drew Geraci, created a cabaret act called Howard and Drew Meet the Invisible Man. This was Crabtree's first club act, and they earned rave reviews for their performances at Don't Tell Mama's. The director of Howard and Drew was Mark Waldrop, with whom Crabtree formed a partnership under the name Figment Productions in 1988. The two of them began work on Whatnot, in which four actors, including Crabtree, played a multitude of roles in a variety show. This show opened the 1990 season for the Off-Off Broadway organization Musical Theater Works, at the Theater at Saint Peter's Church. The next show conceived by Crabtree and Waldrop was When Pigs Fly, a cabaret extravaganza with seven performances at the Duplex Bar in June 1991. This prepared them for the larger scale production that followed called Whoop-Dee-Doo of '92, which had a brief engagement at the Actor's Playhouse on Sheridan Square. After refining the libretto, and shortening the work's name to Whoop-Dee-Doo!, the revue returned to the Actor's Playhouse for eight months in 1993-94 and then went on the road to Boston. During this time period, Crabtree and his companion, Danny Gates, moved from Manhattan to

a farmhouse in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. They hosted weekend-long drag parties for their New York friends, and used the property's barn as a workshop to develop new costumes. The success of Whoop-Dee-Doo! led to an even more outrageously designed show that built upon, and used the same title as the earlier cabaret act When Pigs Fly. Unfortunately, Crabtree's health was in decline due to AIDS, and this forced him to have a reduced role in working on the show. All of his strength went into building the costumes, and he died a few days after completing them, on June 28, 1996. The show opened on August 14 and lived on after him, though, by playing Off-Broadway for two years and winning several awards.





MARK WALDROP:

Mark wrote the acclaimed 75th Anniversary edition of Radio City Music Hall's Christmas Spectacular, which he also scripted. He has continued to write all new lyrics and dialogue for the show from then to the present. Off-Broadway, he wrote book and lyrics for Howard Crabtree's When Pigs Fly (1996 Drama Desk Award /Best Revue, Outer Critic's Circle Award/ Outstanding Off-Broadway Musical, OBIE) and contributed lyrics to: Pete 'n' Keely, Howard Crabtree's Whoop-dee-doo and Hey, Love: The Songs of Mary Rodgers. He created special material for Bea Arthur on Broadway (2002 Tony nomination, Unique Theatrical Event) and Bette Midler's Divine Miss Millennium tour, both of which he also directed. For TheaterWorks,

USA he was lyricist for A Christmas Carol, Gold Rush and Bunnicula, with a book by Charles Busch and music by Sam Davis. He's also crafted lyrics for many industrial shows, benefits and club acts. Luck!, a musical based on an Isaac Bashevis Singer story, with music by Brad Ross and book and lyrics by Mr. Waldrop, is published by Samuel French. The Scottish Musical, a freewheeling and ridiculous retelling of Macbeth, was selected for development by Goodspeed Musicals in 2009. Mr. Waldrop enjoys a busy career as a director, working off-Broadway on small-cast comedies and revues and regionally on large-scale classic musicals. As a performer, he was in the original Broadway casts of Evita and La Cage Aux Folles. His voice can be heard on the soundtracks of Disney's Aladdin, Pocohontas and Mulan. Mr. Waldrop is a graduate of the University of Cincinnati, College-Conservatory of Music.

DICK GALLAGHER:

He played the piano for performers at many New York City venues, such as Carnegie Hall, Town Hall, the Oak Room at the Algonquin, Rainbow & Stars, and the Carlyle. He was the musical arranger for many performers, including Liza Minnelli and Karen Akers. For many years he was the arranger, accompanist and conductor for Patti LuPone, and with writer-director Scott Wittman created



several shows for LuPone. He was the arranger and musical director for two Lupone shows on Broadway: Matters of the Heart (2000) and Patti LuPone on Broadway (1995).



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
